Methodology

On behalf of A New Direction, Ragnar Research conducted a poll of 503 Likely Voters (LVs) across Oregon. Interviews were conducted October 30 through November 1, 2023 by live telephone operators, including landlines (22%) and cell phones (78%). Quotas on age, gender, ethnicity, education, registered party and region were used to ensure a representative distribution. The study's margin of error is ±4%.
